Built in 1832, Schmucker Hall on the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg witnessed the terrible fighting right outside its doors on 1 July 1863 between elements of the First Union Army Corps and the Southern Forces under the command of General A.P. Hill. The structure was used as an observation post by Union Cavalry General John Buford and later served as the largest field hospital in Gettysburg holding 600 wounded men of both sides from July – September 1863.

Among the wounded men treated in the structure was Robert Powell the colonel of the 5th Texas Infantry at Gettysburg. Schmucker Hall was placed on the national register of historic places in 1974, and is today the home of the Adams County Historical Society <http://www.achs-pa.org/>. It is one of the most famous buildings still standing from the American Civil War and has been featured in many Civil War related publications and documentaries. It was also featured in the 1993 major motion picture Gettysburg.

Wayne E. Motts will be joining us for our first meeting of this campaign. He will be telling us about Gettysburg's Schmucker Hall in Peace and War.



About Wayne E. Motts



Born and raised in central Ohio, Wayne graduated from The Ohio State University with a B.A. in history in 1989. Moving to Gettysburg in 1990, Wayne earned a Masters Degree in American History from the Shippensburg University of Pennsylvania in 1994. He was one of the youngest persons ever to complete the licensing process to be a Licensed Battlefield Guide at the Gettysburg National Military Park. He has guided parties around the famous field for 24 years. He has spoken to a wide range of historical bodies and groups on topics related to the American Civil War including the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, DC. In addition to his speaking engagements, Wayne has published several pieces related to the American Civil War in a variety of publications. He is considered the leading authority in the nation on Southern General Lewis Addison Armistead of Pickett's Charge fame and has published the only biography of the general entitled, *Trust in God and Fear Nothing: Lewis A. Armistead, CSA*. For ten years he was the research historian for renowned Civil War Artist Dale Gallon of Gettysburg where he assisted in the historical research of 40 works of fine art. He was the Senior Research Historian for TravelBrains Corporation and in this capacity researched material to be included in a number of audiovisual products related to the American Civil War. The products produced by his research have been endorsed by the History Channel and have won numerous awards. In 2002, he accepted the position of curator at the Cumberland County Historical Society where he managed a collection of 8,000 artifacts. In 2004, he assumed duties as the collections manager of the Adams County Historical Society in Gettysburg. In 2005, Wayne was named executive director of the Society where he oversees a staff of five and 70 volunteers. Wayne office, and the headquarters of the Society, is located inside Schmucker Hall, one of the most famous standing structures of the American Civil War on the campus of the Lutheran Theological Seminary right in the heart of Gettysburg's first day battle ground. For those not going on our battlefield trip, Bayou Bend, which is part of the Houston Museum of Fine Arts, is holding its biennial David B. Warren Symposium on "The Civil War and the Material Culture of Texas, the Lower South and the Southwest." The symposium runs from Friday, October 28 to Sunday, Oct. 30. In addition to battles, the Civil War impacted American economics, technology, communications and many other aspects of American life. The 2011 David B. Warren Symposium examines how the Civil War affected the material culture of Texas, the Lower South, and the Southwest between 1850 and 1880.

In addition to the lectures, a limited number of participants will be able to sign up for a special Sunday tour that provides insights into the material culture of the Civil War soldier. In the morning, a special group tour of the Houston Museum of Natural Science Civil War exhibition will be followed by a trip to the Nau Civil War Collection. After a light lunch and presentation, guests will be treated to a private tour of the collection.

Cost for the Friday-Saturday itinerary is \$30 if you are an MFAH member, \$35 for nonmembers, and \$20 for students. Register by October 7 to receive a \$5 discount. Bayou Bend is one of Houston's great treasures and is renowned for its superb collection of American decorative arts and paintings. The symposium is named in honor of Bayou Bend's founding director emeritus, David B. Warren. Hired by Miss Ima Hogg in 1965 as the first curator of Bayou Bend, Mr. Warren was named Bayou Bend's first director in 1987.
