The HCWRT Presents Wayne Motts Speaking on:

"Pickett's Charge at Gettysburg: A Fresh Perspective"

A native of central Ohio, Wayne graduated with a B. A. in the field of military history from The Ohio State University and holds a M.A. in history from the Shippensburg University of Pennsylvania. He was one of the youngest persons to complete the examination process to be a Licensed Battlefield Guide at the Gettysburg National Military Park. He has guided parties around the battlefield for twentyeight years. He is currently the CEO of the National Civil War Museum located in Harrisburg, PA. He has written on various subjects related to the Civil War in a variety of publications and is the author of the only published biography of Confederate General Lewis A. Armistead who fell in Pickett's Charge. He is the co-author (with James A. Hessler) of Pickett's Charge at Gettysburg: A Guide to the *Most Famous Attack in American History* slated for release in the summer of 2015.

Join Wayne as he presents Pickett's *Charge at Gettysburg: A Fresh Perspective.* This talk will focus on all the burning questions left over from the assault 153 years ago. Drawn from his work, Wayne will cover such topics as why did Lee decide to make the attack? How many soldiers participated in the assault? Who were some of the men involved that July day? Where was Pickett? What role was the artillery to play in the Confederate planning? What was the target? Who got the furthest? What were the casualties? What was the aftermath like? All of these questions and more will be answered in an attempt to unravel the history of the war's greatest frontal assault.
