<u>The HCWRT Presents</u> <u>John F. Schmutz</u> <u>Speaking on:</u>

"The Bloody Fifth"

The 5th Texas Infantry constituted one of only three infantry units from the Lone Star State volunteering to fight in the East, in what was to become Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia. Its ten companies were recruited from east central Texas, with its members willingly choosing to fight over a thousand miles from home to protect their state and loved ones, as well as their state's right to control its own destiny. Sadly, a large number of them were never to see home again. The 5th Texas fought in a total of 38 major engagements, including six of the most significant battles of the war, giving its life's blood at such celebrated fields of battle as Antietam, Second Manassas, Gettysburg,

Chickamauga and Darbytown Road. Its official overall casualty rate topped over 62 percent in four years of fighting.

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The first winter along the shore of the Potomac River at Dumfries, Virginia proved devastating to the soldiers of the regiment. Totally unprepared for unhealthy living conditions in close quarters with a bitter cold so unfamiliar to Texans, they soon began succumbing to measles, typhoid fever, pneumonia, rheumatism, tuberculosis, chronic diarrhea and dysentery at an alarming rate. In all, over 260 men were lost that first winter alone.

At Dumfries, Virginia, the 5th Texas encamped along the Potomac River across from the 5th New York Infantry, also known as "Duryee's Zouaves." These two units traded vicious insults throughout that bitter season across the river, offering to "take care" of the other should they ever meet on the field of battle. At Second Manassas, on August 30,

1862, the 5th Texas was in a position to settle accounts, confronting the 5th New York, which had purposefully chosen to confront the Texans. The 5th Texas emerged from the woods and confronted the 5th New York, situated across a creek on higher ground. The regiment then fell on the Zouaves and, in a short but brutal fight, thoroughly destroyed the New York regiment as a fighting unit. The Texans, flush with that victory, continued on, tearing through the disintegrating Federals and outdistancing the remainder of the Texas Brigade, as well as the rest of the Lee's army, thereby earning its sobriquet "The Bloody Fifth."

At Gettysburg, on July 2, 1863, the 5th Texas was asked to perform the impossible, despite formal protests from division commander Major General John Bell Hood. Ordered to charge across an open field, then climb the heights of Little Round Top, a steep, rocky precipice crowned by thousands of Federal soldiers and artillery on the extreme left of the Union line, the task appeared doomed from the start. However, the intrepid Texans vigorously assailed the heights twice, despite chilling losses at every step. These brave Texans attacked for yet a third and final effort, actually breaking the Union right on the crest. However, they were finally forced to withdraw. The regiment, marching in with 409 men, lost 211 men during the battle, or nearly 52 percent of its effective strength, the most for any regiment that day.

At the Wilderness, the Texans arrived at the focal point of a huge Federal breakthrough just in time to avert disaster. A relieved General Lee inquired as to the identity of these first troops. Their commander, Brigadier General John Gregg, replied "the Texas Brigade." Lee confidently responded "the Texans always move them." In his zeal, Lee attempted to lead the Texans forward, until the men of the 5th Texas halted him, pledging they would take the ground once he retired. The 5th Texas went into the fray with 180 men and officers, suffering 111 in killed and wounded in a mere 25 minutes, including its acting commander, his replacement, and its acting lieutenant colonel.

At the war's end, the 5th Texas surrendered a total of t2 officers and 149 men at Appomattox; it had suffered 303 killed in action, 280 deaths from disease, and 663 wounded during the conflict. Regardless of their situation, their fighting spirit remained intact to the end. In many respects, their resoluteness embodied the motto atop their flag—*Vinere Sat Vincere*—"to live long enough is to conquer." While they failed to win their war, their conquest was in achieving eternal glory in the annals of history.

John F. Schmutz, a corporate attorney, served as a member of the executive management teams of several large, public corporations. His first book, The Battle of the Crater: A Complete History, enjoyed critical acclaim in the Civil War/Military History arena. His recent "The Bloody Fifth". The 5th Texas Infantry Regiment, Hood's Texas Brigade, Army of Northern Virginia, Volume I has met with considerable success since its release. It just won the 2017 Best Book Award in Nonfiction/Military History from the Association of Texas Authors. In addition to immersing himself in the Civil War, Schmutz also pursues genealogical research, remains an avid golfer and general sports fan (especially the San Antonio Spurs), in addition to possessing a passion for international travel, which he indulges in on a frequent basis. He also serves on boards and advises several charitable organizations. Schmutz lives with his wife in San Antonio, Texas. Together they have three grown children living in various parts of the country.

Schmutz holds a B. A. from Canisius College, a Juris Doctor from the University of Notre Dame, and a Master of Laws from George Washington University.

2017 VANDIVER AWARD

We are pleased to announce that the renowned Civil War historian **Gary W. Gallagher** is the recipient of this year's Frank E. Vandiver Award of Merit. Dr. Gallagher stands in the foremost ranks of today's Civil War scholars. He is the John L. Nau III Professor in the History of the American Civil War and Director of the John L. Nau III Civil War Center at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville.

Dr. Gallagher is the author or editor of numerous books and articles on the Civil War. His most recent book, published just over a year ago and co-authored with Joan Waugh, is *The American War: A History of the Civil War Era*. Acclaimed Civil War historian William C. "Jack" Davis has hailed this book as "easily the best one-volume assessment of the Civil War to date." Much in demand as a Civil War battlefield tour guide and lecturer, Dr. Gallagher earned his M. A. and Ph.D. in History from the University of Texas at Austin.

The Houston Civil War Round Table will bestow the Vandiver Award on Dr. Gallagher when he speaks to us at our meeting on October 19, 2017.

The late Dr. Frank E. Vandiver was one of the earliest members of our organization. Each year for the past 35 years, we have bestowed the Vandiver Award in his honor to recognize outstanding contributions to Civil War scholarship or preservation efforts by an individual or an institution. Lynda Crist, a longtime member of our round table and editor of the Jefferson Davis Papers at Rice University, was the first recipient in 1982. Other past winners include Ed Bearss, Frank O'Reilly, Don Troiani, William A. Frassanito, John Nau, James "Bud" Robertson, Ed Cotham, Gordon Rhea, James McPherson, and last year, Eric Jacobson.
