<u>The HCWRT Presents</u> <u>Gary W. Gallagher</u> Speaking On:

"Another Look at the Generalship of Robert E. Lee"

Robert E. Lee has come under considerable criticism over the past 40 years as a general who wasted Confederate manpower, focused too much on events in Virginia, and made strategic and tactical decisions that, on balance, hurt as much as helped the Confederate war effort. Dr. Gary Gallagher's presentation will examine some of Lee's most influential critics with an eye toward offering a balanced assessment of his career as an army commander.

One of the most common criticisms of Lee alleges a lack of appreciation for the problems and importance of the trans-Appalachian Confederacy. One historian observed Lee's inability to see the war as a whole, stating that Lee was obsessed by Virginia, as he considered it the most important area of the Confederacy. Other historians expanded the idea that Lee failed to see the entire strategic situation. Lee's aggressive style of generalship, with its attendant high casualties, also has generated much criticism, with some historians concluding that Lee's devotion to offensive tactics almost bled the South to death—thus sealing the Confederacy's fate.

A different reading of the evidence, however, suggests that Lee pursued a strategy the expectations attuned to of most Confederate citizens and calculated to exert maximum influence on those who made policy in the United States and in Europe. Far from being innocent of the importance of the West and the psychological dimension of his operations, he might have seen more clearly than any of his peers the best road to Confederate independence. His victories buoyed Confederate hopes when defeat lay in all other directions, dampened spirits in the

United States, and impressed European political leaders. They also propelled him to a position where, long before the end of the war, he stood unchallenged as a military hero and his Army of Northern Virginia had become synonymous with the Confederacy in the minds of many southern whites. While his army remained in the field, there was hope for victory; his capitulation extinguished such hope and in effect ended the war.

About Gary W. Gallagher

Gary Gallagher is the John L. Nau III Professor in the History of the American Civil War at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. A native of Los Angeles, California, he received his B.A. from Adams State College of Colorado (1972) and his M.A. (1977) and Ph.D. (1982) from the University of Texas at Austin. He taught at Penn State University for twelve years and headed the Department of History for five. He joined the faculty of the University of Virginia in 1998 where, in addition to his position in the Department of History, he is the director of the John L. Nau III Center for Civil War History.

He is the author or editor of more than thirty books. including The Confederate War (Harvard University Press, 1997), Lee and His Generals in War and Memory (Louisiana State University Press, 1998), Causes Won. Lost. and Forgotten: How Hollywood and Popular Art Shape What We Know About the Civil War (University of North Carolina Press, 2008), The Union War (Harvard University Press, 2011), Becoming Confederates: Paths to a New National Loyalty (University of Georgia Press, 2013), and The American War: A History of the Civil War Era (Spielvogel Books, 2015).

Professor Gallagher was the Times-Mirror Foundation Distinguished Fellow at the Henry E. Huntington Library in San Marino, California, in 2001-2002, recipient of the Cavaliers' Distinguished Teaching Professorship for 2010-2012 (the highest teaching award conveyed by the University of Virginia), and the Philip Merrill Award for Outstanding Contributions to Liberal Arts Education from the American Council of Trustees and Alumni in 2013. Active in the field of historic preservation, he was president from 1987 to mid-1994 of the Association for the Preservation of Civil War Sites (an organization with a membership of more than 12,500 representing all 50 states). He also served as a member of the Board of the Civil War Trust and has given testimony about preservation before Congressional committees on several occasions.

The HCWRT's 2017 Vandiver Award Presented to Gary W. Gallagher

On February 16, 2017, the Houston Civil War Round Table proudly announced that the renowned Civil War historian Gary W. Gallagher is the recipient of this year's Frank E. Vandiver Award of Merit. The Vandiver Award will be bestowed on Dr. Gallagher at the October 19th HCWRT meeting, followed by his keynote presentation.

Dr. Gallagher stands in the foremost ranks of today's Civil War scholars. He is the author or editor of numerous books and articles on the Civil War. His book, published just over a year ago and co-authored with Joan Waugh, is *The American War: A History of the Civil War Era*. Acclaimed Civil War historian William C. "Jack" Davis has hailed this book as "easily the best one-volume assessment of the Civil War to date." Dr. Gallagher is also much in demand as a Civil War battlefield tour guide and lecturer.

The late Dr. Frank E. Vandiver was a distinguished historian and former President of Texas A&M University, the University of North Texas, and Rice University. He was one of the earliest members of our round table, and each year for the past 35 years we have bestowed the Vandiver Award in his honor to recognize outstanding contributions Civil to War scholarship or preservation efforts by an individual or an institution. Lynda Crist, a longtime member of HCWRT and editor of the Jefferson Davis Papers at Rice University, was the first recipient in 1982. Recipients include: Ed Bearss, Frank O'Reilly, Don Troiani, Ed Cotham, Jack Davis, Richard Sommers, John Nau, James "Bud" Robertson, Gordon Rhea, James McPherson, and Eric Jacobson.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE By Jim Godlove

It is with great pleasure that we welcome our 2017 Vandiver Award winner Gary Gallagher. Dr. Gallagher is a most prolific and pre-eminent Civil War historian. He has not only authored or edited numerous Civil War books or articles; he has also been a leader in Civil War preservation. His lecture style is available to the public via "the Great Courses" series where he is rated as outstanding. I can personally recommend his course:" Robert E. Lee and His High Command."

The "Frank E. Vandiver Award of Merit" is awarded "to an individual or an organization substantial contribution to making the preservation of the America's Civil War heritage." As mentioned above, the Award was first presented in 1982 to our own Lynda Lasswell Crist, editor of the Jefferson Davis papers at Rice University. It was named after Frank E. Vandiver (1925-2005) who was a distinguished historian and president of three universities (Rice, University of North Texas and Texas A&M). He was also a member of HCWRT.

While researching the Vandiver Award, I came across the 1955 Charter of the HCWRT. It stated that the purpose of the corporation "is for the study and discussion of the history, battles, personalities and significant events of the War Between the States and to encourage historical research into this period". This is similar to our current mission statement: "to

promote impartial inquiry, study and education about the period of the American Civil War and its causes and aftermath." It is humbling to be associated with an organization that has been promoting interest in the Civil War for 62 years. It is up to all of us to keep the HCWRT going for another 62 years. We can do this by spreading the word about our Round Table. I feel that our list of speakers is second to none. Our speakers realize that they will receive a warm Texas welcome with an engaged and respectful audience. Here's to the next 62 years.

On April 9, 1865 at Appomattox, a Confederate general suggested to General Robert E. Lee that, instead of surrendering to U. S. "Unconditional Surrender" Grant, General Lee should order his army to disperse. Lee responded by saying that would lead to lawless bands from which it would take the country years to recover. Lee stated that it was early spring and that he hoped his men could return home "to plant crops and begin to repair the ravages of war."
