The HCWRT Presents Dr. Thomas Pressly Speaking on:

"Held in the Highest Esteem by All: The Civil War Letters of Corporal William B. Chilvers, 95th Illinois Infantry"

Relatively few rank-and-file Civil War soldiers left an extensive written record of their service. One such soldier, William Burnham Chilvers of the 95th Illinois Infantry, is a major exception to this rule. The 170 surviving letters written between Will Chilvers and family members in Illinois and England tell fascinating stories of massacres, combat, and idealism in the face of the brutal realities of war.

As an orphan growing up in Victorian England, Will Chilvers did not have parents to coach him through his journey of life, a journey that eventually took him across the Atlantic to the United States. Shortly after immigrating to the United States, he found a home in the army and campaigned with the 95th Illinois Infantry. Years of hard marching and tough fighting carried him through the Vicksburg Campaign and into Louisiana and the Red River Campaign. He served at Brice's Cross Roads (Mississippi), in Missouri, then at Nashville, before finishing his career assaulting the Confederate works near Mobile, Alabama. Through it all, Chilvers was a strong abolitionist and sympathetic to the plight of slaves. He wrote about the atrocities faced by African Americans at the hands of Southern whites - as well as by his fellow Union soldiers.

Students of the Civil War are fortunate that Chilvers' correspondence fell into the hands of Dr. Thomas Pressly a few years ago. Together with his co-editor, Dr. Gary Joiner, an expert on the Red River Campaign, Dr. Pressly has skillfully edited and published this correspondence. Dr. Pressly's presentation to our Round Table will center on the development of this remarkable man, Will Chilvers, and how his compassion and humanity rose above the ugliness of the Civil War.

About Dr. Thomas A. Pressly


Thomas A. Pressly III is a rheumatologist in private practice at Shriners Hospital for Children in Shreveport, Louisiana. A native of San Antonio, Tom Pressly graduated from Alamo Heights High School. He obtained his M. D. in 1983 from the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio. Following his medical residency, in 1988 Dr. Pressly took up permanent residency in Louisiana.

Dr. Pressly has a life-long interest in Civil War history. His work in historical medical forensics has been featured on the PBS program *History Detectives* dealing with Civil War female soldiers. His work has also been the subject of articles in *Louisiana Cultural Vistas*, including one titled "The Louisiana State Museum Acquires an Artifact Discovered by a Shreveport Collector on E-Bay."

He serves as program coordinator for the North Louisiana Civil War Round Table, and is an advisor to the board of the Jefferson Historical Society & Museum in Jefferson, Texas.

Dr. Pressly's first publication is the topic of his presentation to our Round Table, *Held in the Highest Esteem By All: The Civil War Letters of Corporal William B. Chilvers, 95th Illinois Infantry,* published in May 2017.

Hood's Texas Brigade Association, Reactivated, is sponsoring its 11th annual scholarly seminar on Friday and Saturday, November 15 and 16, 2019. The theme of this seminar is "Giants of the Texas Confederacy."

A reception will take place Friday night from 6 to 8 pm at the Texas Civil War Museum, which is located at 760 Jim Wright Freeway N. in Ft. Worth, Texas, 76108. The \$35.00 fee for this reception will include light refreshments and a tour of the museum.

Saturday's seminar will take place at the Norris Bible Center, located at 724 Jim Wright Freeway, Ft. Worth, 76108. Registration will be from 8 to 9 am, and the seminar, which includes lunch, is from 9 am to 5 pm. The seminar will also feature speaker book signings, vendors, and exhibits. Cost for the seminar will be \$60.00.

Speakers and topics include Dr. David B. Gracy, "Major Littlefield and the Preservation of Confederate Memory"; Dr. Richard McCaslin, "Francis R. Lubbock and John H. Reagan: To the Bitter End"; Joseph Ricci, "At War and Peace with General John Bell Hood"; and our own John Stevens, "Average Two Scars to the Man: Four Watts Boys of Anderson County, Co. G, 1st Regiment, Hood's Texas Brigade." A block of hotel rooms has been reserved at the Best Western Hotel near the museum; the address is 201 W. Loop 820 N., Ft. Worth. KEY FIGURES IN THE CIVIL WAR



General Thomas Green

Tom Green was an American soldier and lawyer who took part in the Texas Revolution of 1835-36, serving under Sam Houston, who rewarded him with a land grant. Green was clerk of the Texas Supreme Court until the outbreak of the Civil War, when he became a Confederate cavalry leader. After winning several victories, including the Battle of Valverde and the recapture of Galveston, he was promoted to Brigadier General and assigned command of the cavalry division of the Trans-Mississippi Department. Green led his cavalry division to Louisiana to reinforce General Richard Taylor and help stop the advance of Union General Nathaniel Banks toward Shreveport. On April 12, 1864, he was mortally wounded while charging a fleet of Federal gunboats.

THIRD CIVIL WAR ROUND TABLE CONGRESS By Eugene Boisaubin

The Congress was held in St. Louis, Missouri, from September 20-22, 2019 at the Missouri Civil War Museum at Jefferson Barracks and hosted by the CWRT of St. Louis and Mark Trout. Jefferson Barracks was a major U.S. Army training fort from the time of the Civil War through World War II. A final number of attendees has not yet been provided, but about forty CWRTs from across America were present. Donnie Stowe and I represented the HCWRT.

The Friday evening session was dominated by a moving presentation of "Grant - The Desperate Years" as portrayed by E.C. Fields, Jr., PhD, an actor nationally acclaimed for his role as U.S. Grant. Saturday began with "CWRTs and Battlefield Preservations" by Adam Gillenwater of the American Battlefield Trust, describing how CWRTs can be actively involved in local or regional battlefield preservation. This was followed by a detailed presentation of "The Growing Scottsdale CWRT" by President John Bamerl. This is one of the largest and most active CWRTs in the country. John emphasized that the 'best marketing device is happy members', so they make efforts to meet their members' needs through phone calls and surveys.

After lunch, and in response to last year's request to include more CWRTs in discussions, a series of breakout sessions was organized where groups of eight to ten members met with national leaders to ask questions and discuss their own programs. After concluding the breakout session reports, Mike Movius discussed 'Observations and Challenges for Round Tables', including establishing their round table as a 501(c) organization, fund raising opportunities, and identifying new speakers. After dinner, Jim Erwin, a Missouri college historian, gave an informative lecture from his book, "Guerillas in Civil War Missouri". Sunday morning offered attendees the opportunity to visit either the Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery or the U.S. Grant National Historic Site.

This meeting, like the one in 2018, offered an excellent opportunity for members to network, as well as to listen to the reports and experiences of a number of very active CWRTs. One of the best new sites available for CW material and contacts is "cwrt.congress.org" which now has detailed lists of many CWRTs throughout the country, and recommended potential speakers.
