# The HCWRT Presents Stephen M. (Sam) Hood Speaking on:

#### "Patriots Twice"

At our January meeting, Sam Hood will talk to us about the subject of his latest book, *Patriots Twice: Former Confederates and the Building of America after the Civil War.* 

The long and bloody American Civil War claimed the lives of more than 700,000 Americans. When it ended, former opponents worked to rebuild their reunified nation and moved into the future together. Many people may find that hard to believe — especially during an era witnessing the destruction or removal of Confederate monuments and the desecration of Confederate

cemeteries.

In Patriots Twice. Sam Hood identifies more than 300 former Confederate soldiers, sailors, and government officials who reintegrated into American society following the war's conclusion and attained positions of authority and influence in the federal government, the United States military, academia, science, commerce, and In his presentation to our Round industry. Table. Mr. Hood will touch nogu the contributions of many of these 300 men and the positive influence they have had on our country.

Many of the facts in *Patriots Twice* will surprise modern Americans. For example, ten postwar presidents appointed former Confederates to serve the reunited nation as Supreme Court justices, secretaries of the U.S. Navy, attorneys general, and a secretary of the interior. Dozens of former Southern soldiers were named U.S. ambassadors and consuls, and eight were appointed generals who commanded U.S. Army troops during the Spanish-American War.



Ex-Confederates were elected mayors of unlikely cities as Los Angeles, such Minneapolis, and Santa Fe, and served as governors of the non-Confederate states and territories of Colorado, West Virginia, Utah, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Alaska, and the Panama Canal Zone. Additionally, former soldiers gray founded in founded several of our nation's colleges and universities — some exclusively for women and newly freed African-Americans. Others served as presidents of prominent institutions, including the University of California, Berkeley, and taught at universities outside the South including Harvard, Yale, the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and Johns Hopkins. Several others served on the governing boards of the United States Military Academy at West Point and the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland.

Mr. Hood will contend that every American has benefited from the post-Civil War reconciliation when former combatants put down their swords, picked up their plowshares, and accepted the invaluable contributions of thousands of former Confederates. The men who carried the bayonets found common cause and moved on together. This is an important concept that, Sam believes, everyone should embrace.

#### **About Sam Hood**

Stephen M. ("Sam") Hood is a distant relative of Confederate General John Bell Hood. Sam is a retired industrial construction company owner, and lives in Myrtle Beach, SC with his wife of 44 years, the former Martha Ann Hager. He is a 1970 graduate of Kentucky Military Institute and earned a BBA from Marshall University in 1976. Sam is a veteran of the United States Marine Corps Reserve. He is the author of three Civil War history books, the first, John Bell Hood: The Rise, Fall, and Resurrection of a Confederate General won the 2013 Albert E. Castel Book of the Year Award and the 2014 Walt Whitman Book of the Year Award. Sam served on the board of directors of the Blue & Gray Education Society of Chatham, VA and is past president of the board

of directors of Confederate Memorial Hall Museum in New Orleans.

Sam has had a life-long interest in the sport of soccer. In 1979 he founded the men's soccer program at Marshall University, which won the 2020 NCAA Division 1 National Championship. He coached Huntington St. Joseph High School to West Virginia State Championships in 1983, 1984, 1985, and 1988. Sam was named West Virginia High School Coach of the Year in 1990 and 1993 and was a charter inductee into the West Virginia Soccer Association Hall of Fame in 2010.

Please notify me if you need to have a new name tag made. It really helps the new members (and some old) to remember names when attending our meetings!



# WHATEVER HAPPENED TO ...... DICK DOWLING?

Richard (Dick) Dowling, an artillery officer in the Confederate States Army, achieved distinction as commander at the Battle of Sabine Pass in 1863, which resulted in a defeat of Union invasion forces.

After the war, Dowling returned to his saloon business in Houston and became one of the city's leading businessmen. Unfortunately, a yellow fever epidemic struck Houston in the summer of 1867. Dowling fell victim to this epidemic, and died on September 23, 1867. He was buried at St. Vincent's Catholic Cemetery.
