The HCWRT Presents Lorien Foote Speaking on:

"Slack Sheet, Free Fights, and Bloody Heads: Honor and Manhood in the Union Army"

Internal fissures were rife within the Union army during the Civil War: class divisions, regional antagonisms, ideological differences, and conflicting personalities all distracted the army from quelling the Southern rebellion. These internal battles were fought against the backdrop of manhood. Clashing ideals of manliness produced myriad conflicts, as when educated, refined, and wealthy officers found

themselves commanding a hard-drinking group of fighters – a dynamic that often resulted in violence and even death.

Violent hazing rituals, individual boxing matches, bloody fist fights involving crowds of men, and verbal challenges to fight with weapons were common features of life in the Union army. Dr. Lorien Foote's talk will consider the specific and recognized rituals of violence that northern men used to assert manhood and establish honor, including at least 34 incidents in the Union army that included some element of the dueling ritual.

About Lorien Foote

Lorien Foote is the Patricia & Bookman Peters Professor in History at Texas A&M University. She is the author of four books, editor of three volumes, and writer of numerous articles and essays on the cultural, intellectual, and military history of the American Civil War.

Her books include the just-published Rites of Retaliation: Civilization, Soldiers. Campaigns in the American Civil War (2021): The Yankee Plague: Escaped Union Prisoners and the Collapse of the Confederacy (2016), which was a 2017 Choice Outstanding Academic Title; and The Gentlemen and the Roughs: Manhood, Honor, and Violence in the Union Army (2010), which was a finalist and Honorable Mention for the 2011 Lincoln Prize. Dr. Foote is the co-editor, with Earl J. Hess, of The Oxford Handbook of the American Civil She is the creator and principal investigator of a digital humanities project, which is mapping the escape and movement of 3000 Federal prisoners of war. The eighth meeting of the HCWRT's Annual Campaign was held on Thursday evening, March 17, 2022, with 29 attendees gathering to hear Timothy Smith, Civil War historian, lecturer and author, present "The Real Horse Soldiers," the story of Benjamin Grierson's epic Union cavalry raid through Mississippi in 1863. Jim is a consummate story teller and his presentation was both extremely informative and entertaining. During his re-creation of the route of the raid for his book, his easy-going nature and ability to engage others enabled him to gain

insight into local affairs in rural Mississippi during and after that time that other historians could not have attained. An enthusiastic question and answer period followed his presentation. The evening was also highlighted by the presentation to Tim of the 2022 Frank E. Vandiver Award of Merit for excellence in both Civil War scholarship and preservation. Tim was sincerely moved by the award and the congratulatory comments that followed.

Our speaker for April 21 will be Lorien Foote, who will present "Slack Sheet, Free Fights, and Bloody Heads: Honor and Manhood in the Union Army." Dr. Foote is a professor of history at Texas A&M University and a very popular speaker who has presented a broad variety of Civil War topics to our membership in the past several years. Lorien's formal background and accomplishments more are extensively addressed in the preceding article. She will bring copies of her books "Yankee Plague" and "Rites of Retaliation" for sale and autographing. As a tradition, we will also feature our popular quiz and book raffle. Additionally, we have reduced the level of safety for COVID required for the meeting by making personal masking optional. Hopefully we can continue that practice, at least in the foreseeable future. 
MEMBERSHIP REPORT

BOOK RAFFLE By Donnie Stowe

It was really great having everyone come out and enjoy a good meal and a great speaker at our March meeting. Time, however, rolls on and for our April raffle we begin with **BEEFSTEAK RAID** by Edward Boykin. In September, 1864 the most acute need for the defenders of Richmond and Petersburg was food and this book covers General Wade Hampton's raid to alleviate that issue. The second book this month is from past president John Barnes: CIVIL WAR ALMANAC by John C. Fredriksen. This almanac covers day-by-day events of the Civil War and includes an A-to-Z



dictionary which gives biographical profiles of leading military and political figures in the conflict. Our third selection THE is **PAPERS** OF JEFFERSON DAVIS. Volume 11 September 1864 -May 1865 and whose

lead editor is our own Lynda L. Crist. The fourth book this month is TWO YEARS OF GRIM WAR – The Photographic History of the Civil War – Volume 2 by Francis T. Miller (Editor in Chief). This is the second volume in a tenvolume series with photographs by Mathew Brady. Book number five in this month's raffle is LEE by Douglas Southall Freeman. This is an abridgment by Richard Harwell of the Pulitzer Prize-winning four-volume biography of Lee and is a donation from another past president, Jim Godlove.

I'm completing this month's raffle with a sixth book, **THE BROKEN CIRCLE** by David P. Bridges. This was donated to the raffle by Neil Weaver and, though it is a novel, it is full of historically accurate battle scenes and its characters are based on historical figures.

April 14, 1865 - Abraham Lincoln is shot at Ford's Theater

April 15, 1865 - Abraham Lincoln dies; Andrew Johnson sworn in as President of the United States

April 19, 1861 - President Lincoln declares a blockade of Southern ports

April 22, 1861 - Robert E. Lee accepts command of Virginia forces

April 30, 1863 - Battle of Chancellorsville begins near Fredericksburg, Virginia
