The HCWRT Presents Edward Cotham speaking on:

"Sabine Pass: Thermopylae of the Confederacy"

With Ed and Candy Cotham enjoying a wellearned vacation in Portugal, your Past President, Mike Harrington, is presenting this brief overview of Ed's upcoming address to our Round Table.

We are singularly fortunate to have Ed speak to us about the Battle of Sabine Pass. Nobody knows more about this battle than Ed Cotham, the author of the definitive account of the fight that Jefferson Davis once described as "more remarkable than the battle of Thermopylae."

Ed will tell us the story of how on September 8, 1863, Confederate Lt. Richard W. "Dick" Dowling and his 40-odd men of the Jefferson Davis Guards, one of the batteries that made up Cook's 1st Texas Heavy Artillery Regiment, prevented a Union military force of more than 5,000 men, 22 transport vessels and four gunboats from occupying Sabine Pass, the starting place for a planned full-scale invasion that would have given the Union control of Texas. In a battle lasting less than an hour, Dowling and his sharp-shooting cannoneers employed a mere six smoothbore cannon in destroying two Federal gunboats, capturing 350 prisoners and driving the Union armada back to New Orleans. Thanks to their efforts, Houston was spared the fate of Atlanta.

Dowling and his men received the thanks of the Confederate congress for their heroics and the only medals for valor ever awarded by Richmond.



Ed Cotham

The key figure in this brief but consequential battle is, of course, Houston's own Dick Dowling. A native of County Galway, the youthful Dowling immigrated to New Orleans in 1846 to escape the Great Hunger that resulted from the Irish potato famine. Resettling in Houston in 1857, Dowling quickly established himself as a successful entrepreneur. By 1860, Dowling operated several Houston saloons, including the Bank of Bacchus, Houston's leading social gathering spot.

As part of the reaction to the killing of George Floyd, the mayor of Houston ordered the removal of Dowling's statute from public view. Dowling Street in downtown Houston was also renamed. Never mind the fact that neither Dowling nor any of his men, almost all of whom were poor Irish immigrants to Houston and Galveston, held slaves. A much more impressive monument to Dowling and the other defenders of Sabine Pass still stands at the Sabine Pass Battleground State Historic Site.

You will not want to miss this stirring presentation by the Houston Civil War Round Table's own Ed Cotham.

About Ed Cotham

Edward Terrel Cotham, Jr. needs little introduction to members of the Houston Civil War Round Table. A long-term member of our organization, Ed has served as President of HCWRT and is currently an Advisory Director of our organization. In 2006, we proudly bestowed the Frank C. Vandiver Award of Merit on Ed.

A native Texan, Ed grew up principally in Houston. He holds an undergraduate degree in Economics from the University of Houston and an M.A. in Economics from the University of Chicago. In 1979, Ed received a law degree from the University of Texas and returned home to practice law. Currently, Ed serves as the Chief Investment Officer of the Terry Foundation in Houston. The Terry Foundation is the largest private source of scholarships at Texas universities.

A Life Member of the Civil War Preservation Trust, Ed is also a member of the Company of Military Historians, the Society of Civil War Historians, the Southern Historical Association,

and the Author's Guild. Ed and his wife Candy maintain homes in both Houston and Galveston. Ed's ties to the Texas Gulf Coast run deep. He has guided historical tours on Galveston Island, at Sabine Pass and elsewhere on the Texas coast for many years now. Ed's published works focus on Civil War battles and other events in Texas. They include the following widely acclaimed books: Battle on the Bay: The Civil War Struggle for Galveston, published in 1998; Sabine Pass: The Confederacv's Thermopylae, published in August 2004 and the subject of Ed's upcoming talk to us; Juneteenth: The Story Behind the Celebration, published just last year; and Ed's most recent book, A Busy Week in Texas: Ulysses S. Grant's 1880 Visit to the Lone Star State.

Ed will have copies of several of his books available for purchase at our meeting.

RED RIVER CAMPAIGN FIELD TRIP

The Civil War Round Table of Chicago is sponsoring a tour, scheduled for May 3rd through 7th, 2023, entitled "The Red River Campaign in Louisiana." The tour will be limited to one bus with a 50-passenger capacity. The "headquarters hotel" will be the Wyndham Garden located in Alexandria, Louisiana. The tour's guide will be retired Brig. General Parker Hills. Dr. Garry Joiner, chair of the Department of History at LSU Shreveport, will be speaking during the tour. Tour stops will include Mansfield and the Battle of Irish Bend site, among many other locations.

Cost of the tour is \$998.00 per person, double occupancy, or \$1,250.00 per person, single occupancy. Cost includes four nights at the hotel, all meals, all motor coach services, tour guides, admission fees, evening programs, and a comprehensive Tour Kit.

NOVEMBER QUIZ By Jim Godlove

Q: The Union commander of the Sabine Pass Expedition had graduated first in his 1843 class at West Point (Ulysses Grant was 21st in the same class). At the Battle of Fredericksburg, he was in command of the Left Grand Division of the Army of the Potomac. Ambrose Burnside largely blamed him for the defeat.

Both he and Burnside were relieved in January 1863. After a period of inactivity, he was sent to Louisiana to command the XIX Corps.
