The HCWRT Presents Brian Matthew Jordan speaking on:

"A Thousand May Fall: An Immigrant Regiment's Civil War"

A Thousand May Fall is the tale of an ethnically German regiment from northeastern Ohio. This unit was in the thick of the killing at Chancellorsville and Gettysburg, only to be transferred to the war's margins in late 1863. Through its two years and ten months of service, the 107th Ohio battled a host of enemies: Confederates at the front and

Copperheads back home; boredom, chronic disease, and harsh environments; a hostile press, incompetent officers, and suffocating self-doubt. Keeping body, mind, and soul together was not an insignificant challenge for these men, who illuminate deep truths about the realities of Civil War soldiering. This talk chronicles the unsung experiences of their hardluck from enlistment through the onerous errands of postwar memory.

About Brian Matthew Jordan

Dr. Brian Matthew Jordan is Associate Professor of U. S. Civil War History and Chairperson of the Department of History at Sam Houston State University, where he has taught since 2015. Dr. Jordan earned his M.A.,

M.Phil., and Ph.D. degrees in history at Yale, where his doctoral dissertation earned the George Washington Eggleston Prize (for Best U.S. History Dissertation at Yale) and the John Addison Porter Prize, one of Yale's highest academic honors.

He is the author or editor of six books on the Civil War and its era, including Marching Union Veterans Home: and Their Unending Civil War, which was finalist а (one of three runners-up) for the 2016 Pulitzer Prize in History; War The Went Reconsidering the Lives of Union and Confederate Veterans (Louisiana State University Press, 2020); A Thousand May Fall: *Immigrant* Regiment's Civil (Liveright/W.W. Norton, 2021), which scored a starred review from Publisher's Weekly; The Great What Ifs of the Civil War and Final Resting Places: Reflections the on Meaning of Civil War Graves, which the University of Georgia Press will publish next year. His more than 150 reviews, articles, and essays have appeared in scholarly journals. popular magazines, and newspapers. Jordan has contributed chapters to more than a dozen scholarly anthologies and appeared as a talking head in two episodes of the History Channel's 2020 mini-series, "Grant."

Since 2014, Brian has served as the Book Review Editor for *The Civil War Monitor*. He has addressed Civil War round tables in twenty-five states. Brian is currently at work on a major interpretive synthesis of the Civil War and its era, *Crucible of the Republic: The Triumph and Tragedy of the Civil War*, which Liveright/W.W. Norton plans to publish in 2025. Brian resides in Conroe with his wife and eleven-month-old daughter, Elizabeth, who, despite her youth, has already visited four Civil War battlefields!

November Speaker Ed Cotham

THIS MONTH IN CIVIL WAR NAVAL HISTORY

December 20, 1861 – The "Stone Fleet" was sunk off Charleston harbor under the direction of U. S. Navy Captain Charles Davis. Twenty-four old whaling ships filled with stone were scuttled in the port's shipping lanes to further strengthen the federal blockade. Ultimately the effort was futile, as shifting currents soon scoured new channels.

December 12, 1862 – The Union ironclad *Cairo* sank in a matter of minutes, striking a Confederate "infernal machine" (mine) in the Yazoo River. The wreck was located nearly one hundred years later by National Park Service historian Ed Bearss; the story of her discovery and salvage is described in his book *Hardluck Ironclad*.

December 7, 1863 – The passenger steamer *Chesapeake* was seized off Cape Cod by a group of Confederate vigilantes led by John C. Braine. She was later recaptured by a federal warship off Nova Scotia. Braine and most of his men escaped; Braine would later cause more trouble before the war's end.

December 7, 1864 – The blockade runner Stormy Petrel was run ashore and later destroyed off Wilmington by Union blockaders. Admiral David D. Port reported that his squadron had captured and destroyed \$5.5 million of enemy property in the past fifty days, showing the "immense gains the runners make and the straits the enemy is in."
