The HCWRT Presents Jeffrey Hunt speaking on:

"Rappahannock Station"

Contrary to popular belief, the Eastern Theater during the late summer and fall of 1863 was anything but inconsequential. In September 1863, the post-Gettysburg stalemate between Lee and Meade dissolved as each transferred parts of their armies to the battlegrounds around Chattanooga. Lee's early October offensive drove Meade backwards 46 miles toward Washington, but came to grief at Bristoe Station in a bloody clash with Meade's

rear guard. Unable to supply his troops so far north, Lee pulled back to Culpeper County, destroying the Orange & Alexandria railroad as he withdrew to slow the Union pursuit.

As the Army of the Potomac inched forward. Lee undertook a bold strategy to hold the Rappahannock line and lure Meade into a deadly trap. Pressured by Washington to fight but denied strategic flexibility, Meade launched a risky offensive to force his way over the river and bring on a decisive battle. That effort saw the Federals win a handy victory at Kelly's Ford and a stunning triumph at Rappahannock Station, where they destroyed two entire Newly Confederate brigades. uncovered evidence shatters many of the surrounding Rappahannock Station, making it possible to reveal how the fight actually unfolded, the real reason for Confederate defeat, how close Lee came to winning, and why Meade failed to exploit his unexpected victory despite gaining, however briefly, the upper hand in his deadly duel with Lee.

About Jeffrey Hunt

Jeffrey William Hunt is the Director of the Texas Military Forces Museum at Camp Mabry in Austin, Texas, which is the official museum of the Texas National Guard, and an Adjunct Professor of History at Austin Community College, where he has taught since 1988. Prior to taking the post at the Texas Military Forces Museum in 2007, he was the Curator of Collections and Director of the Living History Program at the Admiral Nimitz National Museum of the Pacific War in Fredericksburg, Texas for 11 years.

He holds a bachelor's degree in government and a master's in history, both from the University of Texas at Austin, and is a veteran reenactor, with 35 years of experience conducting, participating in and hosting a wide variety of events ranging from the War of 1812 through the Vietnam War.

Jeff is the recipient of the Gettysburg Civil War Round Table's 2018 Distinguished Book Award, and the Chicago Civil War Round Table's Edwin Cole Bearss Award for Outstanding Civil War Scholarship in 2022. In 2013, Mr. Hunt was appointed an honorary Admiral in the Texas Navy by Governor Rick Perry, in recognition of his efforts at the Texas Military Forces Museum to tell the story of the Texas Navy during the period of the Texas Revolution and Republic.

Mr. Hunt's is the author of The Last Battle of the Civil War: Palmetto Ranch, Meade and Lee at Bristoe Station, The Problems of Command and Strategy After Gettysburg, From Brandy Station to the Buckland Races, August 1 to October 31, 1863, and Meade and Lee at Rappahannock Station: The Army of the Potomac's First Post-Gettysburg Offensive: From Kelly's Ford to the Rapidan, October 21 to November 21, 1863.

Mr. Hunt is also a contributor to the Essential Civil War Curriculum, The Revised Handbook of Texas, The Gale Library of Daily Life, American Civil War, and North & South Magazine.

The final book in his post-Gettysburg Series, Meade and Lee at Mine Run, is forthcoming from Savas Beatie later this year.

Who was this New Yorker?






PERSONALITIES OF THE CIVIL WAR: JOHN BANKHEAD MAGRUDER

John Bankhead Magruder, born in Port Royal, Virginia in 1807, graduated from the U. S. Military Academy in 1830. Magruder, known as "Prince John" due to his flamboyance and theatrical flair, attained a reputation for his social graces and etiquette. He served in various capacities over the next 31 years, including action during the Mexican War, where he learned the value of deceiving and flanking forces outnumbering his own. Magruder also began practicing law while stationed in San Diego in the 1850's.

Once Virginia seceded from the Union, he resigned his commission and was appointed a colonel in the Confederate Army. Due to his actions in Virginia early in the war, Magruder was promoted to major general. During the 1862 Peninsula Campaign, Magruder skillfully utilized the tactics he learned in Mexico by constantly marching his forces to deceive the enemy and ordering sporadic artillery barrages. Later than year, he was reassigned to command the District of Texas, New Mexico, and Arizona. Magruder soon began making plans to retake Galveston from Union forces. These plans culminated in a Confederate victory at the Battle of Galveston in 1863.

Following the war, Magruder spent time in Mexico, then returned to the U. S. He died in Houston in 1871 at the age of 63, and is interred at Galveston's Episcopal Cemetery.

For biographies, we have **JEFFERSON DAVIS:** The **Man and His Hour** by William C. Davis. This book is from the estate of Dale Troth, a former member of the HCWRT.
