The HCWRT Presents Lorien Foote speaking on:

"The Yankee Plague"

During the last winter of the Civil War, nearly 3,000 Union prisoners escaped from Confederate prisons in the Carolinas and fled toward Union army lines. Black and white southerners fed, hid, and guided the fugitives across hundreds of miles of dangerous terrain. Lorien Foote will share what the journey of escaped prisoners reveals about Union soldiers' experiences in the final months of the war and the transformation of the home front to a battle front inside the Confederacy. Dr. Foote reveals connections between the collapse of the Confederate prison system, the large-scale escape of Union soldiers, and the full unraveling of the Confederate States of America. The fugitive soldiers moving across the countryside in large numbers accelerated this collapse as slaves and deserters decided the presence of these Union escapees presented an opportunity for escalated resistance.

About Lorien Foote

Lorien Foote is the Patricia & Bookman Peters Professor in History at Texas A&M University. She is the author of four books, editor of three volumes, and writer of numerous articles and essays on the cultural, intellectual, and military history of the American Civil War. Her most recent book is *Rites of Retaliation: Civilization, Soldiers, and Campaigns in the American Civil War* (2021), which won the Organization of American Historians Civil War and Reconstruction Book Award. Dr. Foote's book *The Yankee Plague*, published in 2016, is the subject of this month's presentation.

She is the co-editor, with Earl J. Hess, of *The Oxford Handbook of the American Civil War.* She is the creator and principal investigator of a digital humanities project, which is mapping the escape and movement of 3,000 Federal prisoners of war. The project includes contributions from undergraduate researchers at four universities. It can be explored online at: <u>https://sites.google.com/tamu.edu/fugitive-federals/the-project</u>. Dr. Foote received her B.A. from the University of Kansas and her Ph.D. from the University of Oklahoma. She is a ballroom dancer and a dog lover. Buzz, her eight-yearold Shih Tzu, is the mascot of the TAMU Study Abroad program and visits the office on campus regularly.
