Chris Mackowski Speaking
on:

"Grant's Next Chapter: Vicksburg, Chattanooga, and the Rise of U. S. Grant"

We often look at "the rise of Ulysses S. Grant" as an almost inevitable arc of the Civil War: from Belmont to Fort Donelson to Shiloh to Vicksburg to Chattanooga to the Wilderness to Appomattox Court House. One victory unleashed the next which unleashed the next, and so on, allowing Grant to rise from an unknown colonel to general-in-chief of the army in an incredibly short period of time.

But that rise was hardly smooth or inevitable. Moments of contingency threatened to derail him time and time again. Was there "a" single moment of particular importance? Well, Grant finished one volume of his memoirs with the aftermath of Vicksburg and opened the second with the battle of Chattanooga. Not only did that point serve as a convenient break for Grant in his narrative, it marked a point of his career that Grant himself saw as a pivotal moment. Vicksburg closed out one chapter, while Chattanooga began other.

About Chris Mackowski

Chris Mackowski, Ph.D., is the editor-in-chief and co-founder of Emerging Civil War and the series editor of the award-winning Emerging Civil War Series published by Savas Beatie. Chris is a writing professor in the Jandoli School of Communication at St. Bonaventure University in Allegany, NY, where he also serves as associate dean for undergraduate programs. He is also historian-in-residence at Stevenson Ridge, a property on the Spotsylvania battlefield in central Virginia. He has worked as a historian for the National Park Service at Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania National Military Park, where he gives tours at four major Civil War battlefields (Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Wilderness, and Spotsylvania), as well as at the building where Stonewall Jackson died.

Chris has authored or co-authored nearly two dozen books and edited a half-dozen essav collections on the Civil War, and his articles have appeared in all the major Civil War magazines. Chris serves as vice president on the board of directors for the Central Virginia Battlefields Trust, on the advisory board of the Civil War Round Table Congress and the Brunswick (NC) Civil War Round Table—the largest in the country. He is also a member of the Antietam Institute and the U.S. Grant Homestead Association. In 2023, he was honored with the Houston Civil War Round Table's Frank Vandiver Award of Merit and also selected as the Copie Hill Fellow at the American Battlefield Trust.



February 1, 1861 – Texas adopts an Ordinance of Secession and schedules a referendum for February 23.

February 3, 1863 – Union General William T. Sherman begins the Meridian Campaign in Mississippi

February 6, 1862 – Surrender of Ft. Henry, Tennessee

February 6, 1865 – John C. Breckinridge named Confederate Secretary of War

February 9, 1861 – Jefferson Davis elected provisional Confederate President

February 16, 1862 – Fort Donelson (Tennessee) surrenders unconditionally to Ulysses S. Grant

February 17, 1864 – Confederate submarine *H. L. Hunley* sinks the USS *Housatonic*

February 29, 1864 – George Custer's cavalry fights skirmishes during a raid on Albemarle County, Virginia
