
2024 JEFFERSON SYMPOSIUM

The Jefferson Historical Society and Museum will hold their 13th annual Civil War Symposium on Saturday, August 3rd, 2024, at the City of Jefferson Convention and Visitors Center, 305 East Austin Street in Jefferson, Texas. The theme of this year's symposium is "War on the Periphery of the Trans-Mississippi."

Registration on Saturday is from 8:00 to 9:00 am, with the program beginning at 9:00 am. Featured speakers include M. Jane Johannson, Steven Mayeux, Henry O. Robertson, and William J. Bozic, Jr. The program also includes a silent auction and various vendors and exhibitors.

The \$80.00 advance registration fee for adults (\$40.00 for students) also includes lunch. There will also be a Friday evening speakers' reception from 6:00 to 7:30 pm; cost for this is \$20.00.




161st ANNIVERSARY TOUR OF SABINE PASS BATTLEGROUND STATE HISTORIC SITE

On the afternoon of September 8th, 1863, a small garrison of fewer than fifty Confederate artillerymen in Fort Griffin defeated a large Union invasion force, including four navy gunboats. Outnumbered more than a hundred to one, a young Irish saloonkeeper from Houston named Dick Dowling led his men to victory in a battle that Jefferson Davis later called the most amazing achievement in military history.

Come join us on Saturday, September 7th, 2024 from 2:00 to 3:30 pm to hear the remarkable story behind this famous battle on the ground where it happened. Our tour will start near the water at the covered area with historic panels explaining the battle. Although the battleground park charges a \$5.00 per car fee for entering automobiles, the tour is free and open to anyone interested in history. The tour will be conducted by Ed Cotham, author of Sabine Pass: The Confederacy's Thermopylae (University of Texas Press, 2004). Ed is a former president of the Friends of Sabine Pass Battleground and the Houston Civil War Round Table. He has been leading tours of Texas Civil War battlefields, including Sabine Pass, for more than 25 years.

The author of many books on the Civil War and Texas history, Ed also serves as a volunteer Marine Steward for the Texas Commission. Sabine Historical Pass Battleground is located at 6100 Dick Dowling Road in Sabine Pass, a small community located off Highway 87 about 15 miles south of Port Arthur. For those who wish to come early, an informal group will be gathering at about 11:30 am for a Dutch treat lunch at the Schooner Restaurant, 1507 S. Hwy 69 in Nederland, Texas. This restaurant is about 95 miles from Houston. It is then about 24 miles from the restaurant to the battleground in Sabine Pass. Those not wishing to join the group for lunch may instead want to make a morning visit to the Museum of the Gulf Coast located at 700 Proctor Street in Port Arthur.



Open from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm, the Museum tells the story of the Texas/Louisiana Gulf Coast region, beginning with paleontology and biology. Permanent exhibits include a section on Native Americans, European contact, the Texas Navy, the Civil War, economic and cultural growth, the petroleum industry, and the region's maritime history.

MEDICAL CARE AND LEARNING DURING THE AMERICAN CIVIL WAR

American medical science and care was quite primitive at the start of the Civil War. Future doctors who desired a good medical education, whenever possible, traveled to Europe well into the twentieth century. In places such as London, England, Paris, France and Berlin, Germany, doctors could learn the most advanced techniques in patient care, including surgery, as well as experimental science.

Initial battles, such as First Manassas, also created thousands of casualties, even within a day, which overwhelmed the handful of physicians who were present. By the end of the Civil War, however, over ten thousand doctors were available. Infectious diseases, such as dysentery, were actually the primary cause of

death in over two thirds of the fatalities, but the germ theory of disease would not be accepted for several more decades. Amputations were the most common form of major surgery, but had to be performed within several minutes since effective anesthesia and intravenous fluids would not be introduced until later in the century. However, amputations created significant advances in areas such as physical medicine and rehabilitation. Mass casualties also eventually created the first effective triage plan for battlefield injuries and a system that is largely in use today.

By the end of the war, American medicine had left the "dark ages' of care, and had advanced to the limits of known medical science at home and abroad. But a true renaissance of medical science and care would take another half century to be discovered and practiced.

July 27, 1861 – Major General George McClellan put in command of the Federal Division of the Potomac

July 31, 1861 – Ulysses Grant promoted to brigadier general
