The HCWRT Presents Lorien Foote speaking on:

"The Yankee Plague"

During the last winter of the Civil War, nearly 3,000 Union prisoners escaped from Confederate prisons in the Carolinas and fled toward Union army lines. Their flight created a "Yankee plague," heralding a grim end to the Confederate cause. Black and white southerners fed, hid, and guided the fugitives across hundreds of miles of dangerous terrain.

By this point in the war, the Confederacy was reeling from prison overpopulation, a crumbling military, violence from internal enemies, and the breakdown of slavery. The fugitive Federals moving across the countryside in mass numbers accelerated the collapse as slaves and

deserters decided the presence of these escapees created an opportune moment for escalated resistance.

Lorien Foote will share what the journey of escaped prisoners reveals about Union soldiers' experiences in the final months of the war and the transformation of the home front to a battle front inside the Confederacy. She uses these ragged Federals as a lens with which to assess the dying Confederate states, providing a new window into the South's ultimate defeat.



About Lorien Foote

Lorien Foote is the Patricia & Bookman Peters Professor in History at Texas A&M University. She is the author of four books, editor of three volumes, and writer of numerous articles and essays on the cultural, intellectual, and military history of the American Civil War. Her most recent book is Rites of Retaliation: Civilization, Soldiers, and Campaigns in the American Civil War (2021), which won the Organization of American Historians Civil War and Reconstruction Book Award. She is the coeditor, with Earl J. Hess, of The Oxford Handbook of the American Civil War. She is the creator and principal investigator of a digital humanities project, which is mapping the escape and movement of 3,000 Federal prisoners of war. Dr. Foote received her B.A. from the University of Kansas and her Ph.D. from the University of Oklahoma. She is a ballroom dancer and a dog lover. Buzz, her nine-year-old Shih Tzu, is the mascot of the TAMU Study Abroad program and visits the office on campus regularly.

THIS MONTH IN CIVIL WAR NAVAL HISTORY

September 17, 1861 - Confederate forces evacuated Ship Island, Mississippi, hurried on their way by a landing party from the U.S. armed transport *Massachusetts*. Soon occupied by troops under General Butler, this strategic island become the staging point for Union assaults against New Orleans.

September 3, 1862 - The Confederate cruiser *Alabama* captured and burned the whaler *Ocmulgee* off the Azores. It would be Raphael Semmes' new command's first 'kill', one of ten in that month alone. During the course of a two-year voyage that took *Alabama* as far as Singapore, her prize list would grow to a record-setting sixty-nine vessels.

September 1 - 2, 1863: Admiral Dahlgren led his fleet of ironclads into Charleston harbor in an attempt to subdue the rebel-held Fort Sumter. His flagship, *Weehawken*, was relentlessly hammered for five hours, causing him to break off yet another failed Union assault on the Southern stronghold.

September 10, 1864 - Commander James Dunwoody Bulloch, Confederate naval agent, wrote Secretary Mallory this day from Liverpool. "I have now the satisfaction to inform you of the purchase of a fine composite ship" Soon commissioned as the C.S.S. Shenandoah, she circled the globe to destroy New England's Arctic whaling fleet before finally surrendering on the River Mersey in November 1865, the last Confederate flag lowered.

PERSONALITIES OF THE CIVIL WAR: JOHN CLEM



John Lincoln Clem was born in Newark, Ohio in 1851 and ran away from home at age 9 in hopes of joining the Union army as a drummer boy. At first rejected by an Ohio regiment, he was later adopted as mascot and drummer boy by the 22nd Michigan.

Despite the popular legend that Clem, also known as "Johnny Shiloh," served as drummer boy with the 22nd during the Battle of Shiloh, historical evidence suggests that the 22nd wasn't mustered into service until four months after the battle. However, Clem served as drummer boy during the Battle of Chickamauga. Following this battle, Clem was promoted to sergeant, thus becoming the youngest soldier ever to be a noncommissioned officer in the U.S. Army. He was also twice wounded during the war.

Having completed high school in 1870, Clem continued his military service, which included serving as chief quartermaster at Fort Sam Houston in Texas. Clem retired in 1915 as a brigadier general. He died in 1917 and is buried at Arlington National Cemetery.
