
About Neil Chatelain

Neil P. Chatelain is assistant professor of history at Lone Star College - North Harris who specializes in researching naval activity of the U.S. Civil War. Having spent nine years in the

US Navy, Neil deployed around the world, earning a surface warfare officer designation. He has also earned a MA in history from the University of Louisiana - Monroe, a MEd in history and social studies curriculum and instruction from the University of Houston, and a BA in history and political science from the University of New Orleans.

Neil is the author of the forthcoming *Treasure* and *Empire in the Civil War: The Panama* Route, the West and the Campaigns to Control America's Mineral Wealth and has authored the books Defending the Arteries of Rebellion: Confederate Naval Operations in the Mississippi River Valley, 1861 - 1865 and Fought Like Devils: The Confederate Gunboat McRae. He has also written for numerous peer-reviewed journals and popular magazines, and has spoken at history conferences, history organizations, and Civil War round tables.
