and the Northern citizenry advocated beginning in 1865, as the atrocities at Andersonville and the arrest of Captain Henry Wirz began to unfold.

Madelaine Setiawan's presentation will uncover the stories of the fleeing fugitives and the role of Southern Unionist women in their escape. Ms. Setiawan reveals how the term "Unionism" was never reserved strictly for white Americans. It was a term extended to Black men who fought for the Union, but also to Black women who prisoners consistently remembered in their memoirs for their kindness, hospitality, intelligence, and their help in guiding them back to safety.

"Southern Unionist Women as Remembered by Fleeing Fugitives"

In the late nineteenth century, Union-published post-war accounts that displayed stories of Southern Unionist women came to the forefront, indicating that these women were overt political actors who frequently risked their lives to feed, hide, and aid Union soldiers and prisoners using their extensive network of communication, allies, and geographical awareness. These stories became critical to the prison retribution propaganda that Republicans

About Madelaine Setiawan

Madelaine Setiawan is a PhD candidate at Texas A&M University. She specializes in the U. S. Civil War and Reconstruction, War and Memory, and 19th-century Women and Gender. Her research has been supported by the Massachusetts Historical Society, the Virginia Center for Civil War Studies, and the Melbern G. Glasscock Center for Humanities Research, among others. Her Master's thesis, "'Trust to Us, the Union Men of the South': The 1866 Southern Loyalist Convention and the Fight for Reconstruction" highlights the role of Southern Unionists and their rhetoric during Reconstruction. For her dissertation. Madelaine examines the ways in which Southern Unionist women contributed to the wartime effort and remembered. commemorated. were forgotten afterward.

Prior to Texas A&M, Madelaine graduated Summa Cum Laude from Lee University with a BA in History and Political Science. She currently holds the Military Historical Society of Massachusetts Fellowship from the Massachusetts Historical Society.

President's Comments By Walker Agnew

Once again, we enjoyed a wonderful presentation this past month. Dr. Leah Tarwater presented "Kentucky Soldiers in the Civil War." As a border state, Kentuckians had a true split in loyalties to either the Union or the Confederacy. They first attempted to remain neutral, but eventually became a Union state. Of the 100,000 soldiers from the state, about two thirds fought with the Union and about one third with the Confederacy. Native son John C. Breckinridge, who had been U.S. vice president under James Buchanan, was not successful in his run for president in 1860, and later became a general in the Confederate army. As a border state, it still had slavery and many thought it would be protected. After the war, the state did not ratify the 13th Amendment, although they formally did in 1976, some 110 years later.

Remember, our December meeting will be on the 2nd Thursday of the month, December 11th, where we will hear from our Gary Chandler Graduate Student Award winner, Madelaine Setiawan from Texas A&M. Her topic will be "Southern Unionist Women as Remembered by Fleeing Fugitives."
